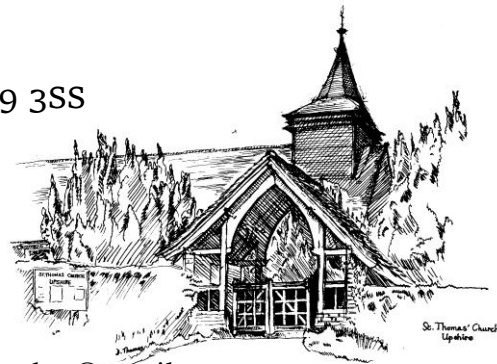

The Vicar writes:

In his 2005 book “Yes Man” author Danny Wallace details an extraordinary year in his life when, following a suggestion by a man he met on the journey home, he decided to say “Yes” to any offers that came his way.

He said “yes” to pamphleteers on the street, the credit card offers stuffing his mailbox and solicitations on the internet. He got a bad haircut, was hypnotized by a dog and bought a mint green Nissan Figaro. He also met dozens of new people, got a huge promotion, and found true love.

As the opening words of his book say – “It is quite incredible how a bus – a simple, red, London bus – can change your life.”

As we approach Christmas once again our thoughts naturally turn to another “yes”, a yes that changed not only the life of the person who uttered it, but the very life of our world.

At the annunciation, the Angel Gabriel was sent by God to tell Mary that she had been chosen to be the mother of his son. That through her the redemption and salvation of humanity would be enacted. Having announced this news and outlined to her what was going to happen then...he waited. God’s plan was conditional upon her response.

A central tenet of the Christian faith is the precious notion of free will or consent, to give it a more modern terminology. Human beings have been created with the ability to decide what they wish to do, to walk their own path and make their own decision. No-one, not even God, can make a person do something if they do not consent to do it.

Thus the birth of our saviour, the reason we celebrate Christmas at all, was utterly dependent upon Mary’s consent to what was being asked of her.

Interestingly, the biblical account of this event records that Mary did not say yes straight away. She asked questions – sensible, assertive questions – and then she thought for a while. It was only after this that she declared “Yes! I’m in! So be it! I trust you Lord!” And the rest, as they say, is history....

So as we gaze again upon the nativity scene this month I pray that the story of Mary inspires and encourages you to say “yes” to God, whatever he may ask of you.

You may not end up with a bad haircut, being hypnotized by a dog or buying a dodgy green car but you know what... I am pretty sure you will find true love. True love from the son of God that Mary’s “yes” enabled to be born into the world, the birth of whom we celebrate this Christmas.

May God bless you and all you love this Christmas time.

ST THOMAS’ SEEDLINGS aligned to Messy Church

We have been asked several questions regarding the new children’s group at St Thomas’, called ‘Seedlings’. The word was chosen by those who run the group – this could go on to ‘Saplings’ or ‘Mighty Oaks’ depending on the age group, but I am getting ahead of myself! Our Seedlings ages range from babies to pre-school and several years beyond – it does not matter!
Messy Church is a way of being Church for families and others. It is Christ-centred, for all ages, based on creativity, hospitality and celebration, there is no charge for Messy Church Seedlings. See St Thomas’ website for further information.
We spend our time singing happy songs, chatting, story telling and prayer and divide up to try several different activities each month. So far we have coloured in posters and pictures, made a hanging sign for our bedroom doors, made a ‘stained glass’ table light, grown cress and broad beans in small containers and made a hedgehog picture. There is always a ‘take home’ element – personalised bags provided.
After our activities we sit down for a story – theme based: harvest, Saints and in December the Nativity story told from the point of view of an owl! This time often leads to chats and questions, we are very open and flexible.
Plenty of toys, and play mats are available for the very young ones. A parent or carer stays with each child or family of children, so we are able to welcome babes in arms and push chairs!
The last five minutes onwards are spent in snacking and juice drinking and just generally chatting – our seedlings leave when they are ready – and then we clear up!
Please check with Rev Jane Yeadon or any of the helpers if you have a query. We generally meet on the first Saturday of the month between 3 and 4pm, but please note it will be the second Saturday in January (the 8th).

GROWERS CORNER

Having viewed the seed merchants websites and catalogues you can now plan your borders and veg patch for next season. Place your orders for seeds etc and await their delivery.

On a nice day you can check your cold frame to see how your broad beans and sweet peas are growing. Remember any watering should be carried out after the frost and before lunchtime, also make sure that you have been able to keep the mice at bay.

If the ground is frost free, work from a pair of scaffold boards to prevent compaction of the soil and to keep mud off your boots.

On a dry day raking up all the leaves on your lawn is a good job done. Save the leaves for leaf mould for digging in later on your veg plot.

Your borders could benefit from a tidy up but only cut the dead flower heads, leave the rest of the plants for protection from the winter frosts.

In an area in a quiet corner of your garden you could position a bug hotel or a hedgehog house.

UPSHIRE PRIMARY FOUNDATION SCHOOL

You may have noticed that Upshire Primary Foundation School have recently taken delivery of 2 train carriages. Here is some information from the school about the project.

This project started way back in 2019 when we got a grant to upgrade our library as part of the Tesco Bags of Help Scheme. The idea grew and our Headteacher, Mrs Blackburn, thought that it would be very exciting if we were able to get a disused train carriage to enable us to expand our library and make it more accessible to pupils during lunchtime. Our Deputy Head, Mrs Gritton, spent time emailing and phoning train companies until Porterbrook kindly offered to donate a carriage to the school.

Before the project could start in earnest, Covid-19 sent us all into lockdown and socially distancing children in school became a reality. As we looked to the future and the options available to accommodate children in a Covid safe manner, Porterbrook generously agreed to donate a second carriage. This would provide us with more space to offer services such as breakfast and afterschool club whilst still having the time to sanitise areas and resources between different groups of pupils.

Looking to the post Covid future we would be able to use the second carriage to offer additional pre-school places and let others from the community use the carriages outside of school hours to offer counselling sessions, adult literacy and numeracy classes and much more.

At this point we realised that we needed help with the installation of the carriages as this was a complex project to undertake. We had worked with Modular Building Consultants previously and they were happy to take onboard our unusual challenge.

With Modular Building Consultants guiding us we secured the help of Network Rail who invited companies, including Taziker and Railscape, to assist us. We have been very fortunate that many companies have helped us thus far free of charge or at a reduced cost. We have also benefited from cash donations and many organised fundraising events organised by the school PTA and individuals.

The children have all been very excited about the arrival of the carriages and enjoyed watching them being moved into their final positions. They are now keen to see the transformation into safe learning spaces and to read books in the large 1st Class seats!
