Greetings, Beloved Congregation!

As the glorious month of July unfolds before us, we are filled with gratitude for the warmth of summer, the abundance of blessings, and the steadfast love of our Heavenly Father. It is with great joy that we gather once again to share the latest news, reflections, and opportunities within our church family.

In the midst of these sun-kissed days, we are reminded of the countless reasons we come together as a faith community. We find solace in our collective worship, draw strength from our fellowship, and grow in our devotion to the One who guides our every step.

Ok, I have a confession to make. I didn't write that introduction to my letter. In fact, no one did. It was automatically generated by an artificial intelligence (AI) chatbot called chatGPT. All I had to do was ask it to write an introduction to a July church newsletter article, and away it went, in fact I asked it to do the same thing three times and each time it wrote something similar, but distinct.

GROWERS CORNER

Summer has now arrived rather late this year and in some cases the early growing season has been lost. We have lost a large number of shrubs etc due to a protracted cold spring. Some of your existing plants may divide doubling your plant numbers.

You may go on a spending spree but be warned – to replace like for like can be a very expensive exercise. You may be advised to buy small plants but you will have to be patient as it may take a number of years to get to the size of those plants you have lost.

If you like growing something different, a vast range of unusual seeds etc are available from Seeds of Italy, 020 8427 5020, Unit DZ Phoenix Business Centre, Rosslyn Crescent, Harrow HA1 2SP for a catalogue or further information.

With the soil now warming up, salad crops, chard, spinach and herbs – basil etc, can now be planted out but must be well watered for best results.

Look to next spring when greens are in short supply, planting purple sprouting, curly kale etc now but it is advised to cover the plants with net against the cabbage white butterfly.

Next month the 2024 spring bulbs will be on sale at garden centres and nurseries in your area but the prices could be a nasty shock to you! Beware of the high prices!

UPSHIRE MOTHERS' UNION

Mother's Union Literacy and Financial Education Programme is another Upshire Branch has supported. It is one of the most cost effective literacy programmes in the world. Mother's Union train community volunteers as literacy facilitators, who are then equipped to run Literacy and Financial Education groups in their own communities.

The programme began in 2000 and was designed to give an holistic approach to empowering some of the most marginalised communities whilst meeting the Millennium Development Goals. The programme uses participatory methods to enable communities to acquire basic literacy and numeracy skills whilst discussing and planning action on their daily issues and challenges.

In Burundi and Sudan/South Sudan Mother's Union members have brought literacy learning to over 20,000 women and men in just over a decade. Thanks to generous funding from Comic Relief and a strong working relationship with Five Talents, the Literacy and Financial Education groups are stabilising family and community life.

All Literacy and Financial Education groups are open to everyone, crossing the boundaries of religion, age, gender and tribe, enabling community unity.

The groups enable communities to share much more than just basic educational skills. The programme specifically focuses on building knowledge and skills, in business development and community savings group formation, for its members. As a result women are now gaining financial independence, have more autonomy to manage their lives and are participating in household decision making as well as community politics and leadership.

One of the huge achievements is that as women are given education and value through the groups, attitudes towards them gradually change. Both genders discuss together the positive contributions of women, and realise how much more women can do than raise a family and run a home. Contributing to the family income as result of learning has seen many women enjoy greater equality in their married relationships.

In May we held our first Afternoon Cream Tea Event. Thank you all everyone who came along and supported us. It was a very enjoyable afternoon and we received some lovely comments from our guests. Thank you also to all the members who help organised it and worked hard to make it a success, especially to Pam and Lyn who made the Scones and Jam.

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ST THOMAS' CHURCH – A Short History

It is thanks to funding by the Buxton Family, Sir Thomas Fowell and Lady Victoria Buxton, that in 1902 St Thomas' Church was built for Upshire Village. The specification wisely provided that the footings be unusually deep due to the steep slope of the land and clay soil. The stone used came from Chilmark in Wiltshire and the interior cross beams, belfry and fine pillars made of oak brought up from the west country. The chancel has an enriched plaster ceiling and there are wood and stone carvings throughout. The roof is of hand-made tiles, a small shingle spire crowns the timber tower, the style is typical of some much older Essex churches. Above the Chancel arch is a beautifully painted verse from Psalm 100:

'Go your way into His gates with thanksgiving and into His courts with praise; be thankful unto Him and speak good of His name'.

There are some fine oak furniture of note – the altar table, the pulpit, the cross which rises from a beautiful base symbolising the River of Life. The eagle lectern was the outcome of a collection from the village community. The oak communion rails were presented to Sir Thomas and Lady Buxton by their ten children on their golden wedding in June 1912. The font dedicated in 1922 is a memorial to many Upshire residents lost in WW1 and is engraved with their names.

Following the death of Sir Thomas and Lady Buxton – at some stage in the early 1920s ownership of the church was handed to trustees and in March 1933 the church passed to the St Albans and Chelmsford Church Trust.

Over time after various boundary changes and housing developments the church now forms part of the parish of Upshire within the benefice of Waltham Abbey.

As with any building of this type there is ongoing running costs and constant programme of maintenance, hence fundraising and social outreach has been an important part of church life. Records show successful 'Parish Tea and Entertainment' from as early as 1906 and onwards to the present time where afternoon teas run from May to September, plus a programme of community events throughout the year. Over the years several groups evolved – the oldest established of which is the Mothers' Union founded by Lady Victoria Buxton in 1892. Also during this period a tradition was established for an annual 'Sale of Work' which continues to this day in the form of the annual Bazaar. Other groups formed during earlier years were the cubs, guides and scouts. There was a flourishing Sunday School, which from 1958 records consisted of 50 children ensuring the continuation of Christian faith.

St Thomas' today provides a focal centre for the Upshire Community to which all are welcome to join – our mission is to enhance God's message and continue to share this with local and other residents ensuring fulfilment for future generation.

Plastic Pollution

We're all familiar with the plastic rubbish that litters our streets and countryside. In this country the majority of plastic rubbish is disposed of responsibly in recycling or rubbish bins but have you ever thought about what happens in countries where there are no such facilities. 2 billion people have no safe way to dispose of rubbish, and it is people in poverty who are suffering the worst impacts of this rubbish problem. Burning it releases toxic fumes, it makes people sick and floods communities – causing up to a million deaths each year. That's one person dying every 30 seconds. And the rapid growth of single-use plastics is making this crisis worse. It's fuelling our throw-away culture, threatening people's health and adding to the climate emergency.

Recent research shows that 218 million people across the world are at risk of flooding made worse by plastic pollution. That is the equivalent of the entire population of UK, France and Germany combined.

Tearfund is currently working to try and help communities who are suffering from the effects of plastic pollution and to raise awareness of the problem.

In north-east Brazil, the congregation at Coqueiral Baptist Church – located in the city of Recife, state of Pernambuco – is responding to the devastating impacts of plastic pollution on their community. Because there's no local waste collection, the nearby river has become choked with rubbish. Even the slightest rainfall can cause floods. Last year, in Pernambuco state, at least 128 people were killed in floods, and more than 9,000 people were made homeless.

Josias, one of the church's pastors, explains, 'What makes the river overflow? The huge amount of plastic and rubbish in it.' The church is responding in many different ways, with support and training from Tearfund. When floods occur, they provide meals, clothes, shelter and medical help, and send brave volunteers out in boats to rescue those who are stranded. The church has also organised protests and petitioned the mayor to clear up the rubbish. And they've become a 'zero-waste church', modelling how to care for creation.

The second session of the Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee to develop an international legally binding instrument on plastic pollution, including in the marine environment (INC-2) took place from 29 May to 2 June 2023 at the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) Headquarters in Paris, France. During the week Tearfund staff were present to raise awareness of the health impact of plastic pollution poorer communities. The session produced a mandate to prepare a zero draft of the international legally binding instrument on plastic pollution.


